

In 1860, Florence Nightingale wrote her seminal book Notes on Nursing, What it is and What it is not. Her themes included environmental issues like cleanliness, circulation of air, provision of heat and cooling, health of houses, light, noises, food and collecting and analyzing data. In it, she described her book as simply "hints for thought to women who have personal charge of the health of others." While stating that nursing was only done by women is inaccurate today (and I would change that sentence to read hints for thought to individuals who have personal charge of the health of others), nonetheless, that simple line was, for me, thought provoking.

I have never thought of myself as having personal charge of the health of others, but after thinking about it, it is true! Yes, I care for my patients and provide medication, treatments, and education, and I am an enthusiastic (some would say outspoken) advocate for them, especially in our correctional setting, but having "personal charge of their health" elevates my role and responsibilities to a level I had not considered. I know some of you reading this will be quick to point out that the patient has some responsibility that cannot be excluded, and that is true, but especially in our correctional environment where a patient will not get a health evaluation, medications or treatments unless a nurse facilitates the process, we definitely do have personal charge of their health. What an awesome responsibility!

Also at this time, I have been working with Dr. Deborah Shelton to develop the first class offered by the **Center 4** <u>Correctional Nursing</u>, From Exhaustion to Empowerment: Reclaiming your Purpose in Correctional Nursing, which includes discussion about professional identity in correctional nursing and reflection activities that help the participant to clarify their personal and professional goals. Of course, before offering the pilot, I took the class and completed the reflections. These exercises, combined with my thoughts about Florence Nightingale's simple phrase telling me I had personal charge of my patients' health, really did bring me back to a time when I had just begun my nursing journey, allowing me to appreciate my youngnurse enthusiasm. Then, as I pondered more, I was able to consider all the experiences that led me to where I am today. I stumbled into Correctional Nursing and correctional healthcare thirty years ago, and, after making it my career, I honestly would not change anything!


